Matthew 20:1-16

Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you" been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. NEW PORT PIRIE BISHOP

Bishop-elect Karol Kulczycki is expected to arrive back in Australia from Poland at the end of next month to take responsibility for the vast Pt Pirie diocese. Stretching




from Uluru to Port Lincoln and from the Western Australian border to the River Murray, the diocese is three times the size of Poland.

Born in Poland in 1966, Fr Kulczycki was ordained to the priesthood in Trzebinia in 1994 and is currently based in Poland. He spent 21 years serving the Church in Western Australia, including in parish ministry, as vocations director and as a college chaplain.

"God is working in mysterious ways in my life. Firstly, calling me unexpectedly to religious and priestly life; secondly, directing my heart to serve Him in Australia and now serving Him and His people in the Port Pirie Diocese

"Serving in different ministries and places in Western Australia gave me a bit of understanding of the beauty and vastness of the Australian land.

"I love the Australian Outback. Of course, it will take a bit of time for me to know the land, people, parishes, schools and other ministries."

SAINT MATTHEW Feast Day 21st September

Matthew was a publican, that is, a taxcollector for the Romans. Publicans were regarded by the Pharisees as



sinners, not allowed to trade, eat, or pray with other Jews. One day, while Matthew was seated at his table of books and money, Jesus looked at him and said two words: "Follow me." Matthew rose, leaving his pieces of silver to follow Christ. His new name in Christ, Matthew, means "Gift of God." St. Matthew was the first to put down in writing our Lord's teaching and the account of His life. He wrote his Gospel in Aramaic, the language that our Lord spoke and was written to convince the Jews that their Messiah had come in the person of Jesus. The only other outstanding mention of Matthew in the Gospels is the dinner party for Christ and His companions to which he invited his fellow tax-collectors. The Jews were surprised to see Jesus with a publican, but Jesus explained that he had come "not to call the just, but sinners."

Not much else is known about Matthew. According to tradition, he preached in Egypt and Ethiopia and further places east. *Catholic Culture, Franciscan Media*

SAINT PIUS OF PIETRELCINA (Padre Pio) Feast Day 23rd September (1887 – 1968)



Padre Pio, a farmer's son, was born in the Italian village of Pietrelcina. He joined the Capuchin Friars at sixteen and was ordained a priest in 1910. For fifty years at the monastery

of San Giovanni Rotundo he was a much sought after spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor who devoted his life to the Eucharist and prayer. While praying before a cross on September 20, 1918, Padre Pio received the stigmata. He is the first priest ever to be so blessed. Today there are over 400,000 members worldwide in prayer groups begun by Padre Pio in the 1920s.

In 1956 he founded the House for the Relief of Suffering, a hospital that serves 60,000 a year. Padre Pio died on September 23, 1968 at age 81. *Catholic Culture*

PARISH FINANCES

Dear Parishioners

When the Parish sent out your new Planned Giving envelopes at the beginning of July, you were advised that the **Parish Income** would be reviewed to determine the impact of the closure of the church during March, April and May as a result of Covid 19 restrictions.

I am delighted to report that our Year to Date Planned Giving Income as at 31st July was \$33,120 against a YTD Budget of \$34,120 (-\$1000). This is a wonderful result and our sincere congratulation and thanks to you all for continuing your contribution to the Planned Giving Program. Some Parishioners chose the direct debit option, others gave via the Archdiocese website and the remainder delivered their envelopes to the Parish Office Box – a great commitment.

As a result the Parish was able to meet ongoing expenses as well as install Solar Panels on the annex at St Joan of Arc and the Presbytery.

He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said. "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'

DID YOU KNOW?

- In the Greco-Roman world, casual labourers used to gather in the agora or town-square waiting for employers to hire them.
- In the early Church there was sometimes a jealousy between those who had believed in the risen Christ from the earliest days and thus suffered persecution for their faith and those, especially Gentiles, who came to belief later on.

EXPLORING THE WORD

This gospel offers yet another challenge to human ideas about what is just and reveals the generosity of God. The Master makes a point of having those who came last, paid first. One must imagine the queue, with the newly arrived workers at the head and those tired from a full day's labour watching as the late-comers are paid in full. In many ways, the audience is drawn into sharing their disappointment and indignation. If those employed early had been at the head of the queue, they would have gone off happy with their contracted wage. The problem arises only when they see the late-comers reaping the same reward. This is an indication of a problem which has arisen in Matthew's community. Those Jewish Christians who have risked all and believed from the beginning, are now seeing the new-comers to faith being offered the same reward. Jesus' answer is simple: the kingdom is God's. God can do as he likes and what God chooses is to welcome all and offer reward to all who come to belief, no matter at what stage.

LIVING THE WORD

The 'vineyard' in the Hebrew Scriptures always referred to Israel, the people of God, while the 'master' was God himself. This parable would have been clearly understood to be about being gathered into God's people and who was welcomed into the kingdom. The unbounded generosity of God is highlighted.

- In what ways are we able to offer generosity to new-comers in our parish or local area?
- What welcoming ministries exist in our parish for those who move into the area or for new migrants?
- Who are the people in our society who are in need of generosity and welcome?
