
GOOLWA INTERCHURCH

SAINT POPE PAUL VI (1897 – 1978)

Feast Day 26th September

Giovanni Battista Montini was born in northern Italy. After ordination in 1920, Giovanni did graduate studies in Rome before joining the Vatican Secretariat of State in 1924, where he worked for 30 years. In 1954, Fr. Montini

was named archbishop of Milan In 1958, he was the first of 23 cardinals named by Pope John XXIII.

Elected pope in June 1963, his greatest accomplishment was the completion and Implementation of Vatican II. Paul VI amazed the world by visiting the Holy Land in January 1964. The pope made eight more international trips. In 1965, he instituted the World Synod of Bishops. He established diplomatic relations between the Holy See and 40 countries, and instituted a permanent observer mission at the United Nations in 1964. Pope Paul VI died at Castel Gandolfo on August 6, 1978, and was buried in St. Peter's Basilica. He was beatified on October 19, 2014 and canonized on October 14, 2018. *Franciscan Media*

SAINT VINCENT DE PAUL (1576-1660) Feast Day 27th September

St. Vincent de Paul was born in Gascony, France, and died in Paris. He studied theology at Toulouse and was ordained a priest in 1600. He was captured



by Moorish pirates and sold into slavery in Africa, but freed in 1607 when he converted his owner.

On his return to France he became successively parish priest, grand almoner of the galley slaves, and spiritual director of the Visitation nuns. He founded the Congregation of the Priests of the Mission or Lazarists (now known as Vincentians) to preach especially to country people. With the help of Louise de Marillac he established the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity to care for young girls, for the needy, sick, and foundlings. He died in 1660 at St. Lazarus's, the centre of his Congregation. Leo XIII proclaimed him special patron of charitable institutions. *Catholic Culture*

Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah. I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes." Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you. they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not vours, who will give you what is your verv own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'

EXPLORING THE WORD At first reading, this text is very puzzling. How can dishonesty be so rewarded? The action in the text is easier to understand when we know something of how commerce was conducted at the time. According to Jewish Law, it was not permissible to charge interest. To get around this, the practice developed of increasing the original debt to cover what would

have been a normal interest rate. What the cunning steward has done is to reduce the debt to the level of the original loan. The Master will be paid his due according to the Law, but no more. If the Master complained about this action, his sin would come to light. The real criticism in this text is directed to those who have been entrusted with the riches of God's kingdom and have not used them well. The point is that all who are called to share the riches of the kingdom must commit themselves to careful administration of those inestimable treasures. This is much more important than administering the riches of this world.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Just like the steward in this story, we are entrusted with God-given talents and we must use them in a way that will yield genuine riches. Increasingly in the modern world, we are also aware that we must be good stewards of God's creation to ensure its riches for future generations.

DID YOU KNOW?

- One of the dominant themes in Luke's Gospel is the right use of money and the need to beware of becoming distracted by it from the pursuit of God.
- In Jesus' time, wealth was seen as reward for virtue so these words were a great challenge
