SEVENHILL CELEBRATIONS

A concert by acclaimed harpist and soprano Emma Horwood is just one of the activities planned as the Sevenhill Parish celebrates major anniversaries over the coming months.



November 18 marks the 150th anniversary of the consecration of St. Aloysius Church at Sevenhill, while the 100th anniversary of the consecration of Our Lady Queen of Peace Church at Auburn is on November 19. The parish is also commemorating 100 years since the departure from St. Patrick's Church at Undalya on November 12.

Prior to the major celebrations in mid-November, several lead-up events have been planned. They included "History of Sevenhill" presentation by Bishop Greg O'Kelly on October 26, a lace and vestment display at St. Aloysius Church from November 4-6, and the concert by Emma Horwood on November 6.

Emma will perform sacred music spanning the ages, taking full advantage of the sublime acoustics of St. Aloysius Church. A highlight of the concert will be the premiere of a new work, written especially for the occasion by Christopher Willcock and based on the poem Brother Waldmann's Last Carving by Andrew Bullen. Br. Waldmann did his final sculpting beside the main church door when he was nearly blind.

Tickets are \$10, proceeds going to church and organ restoration.

Today's feast honours the obscure as well as the famous—the saints we all have known.



Hurry, because I must stay at your house today.' And he hurried down and welcomed him joyfully. They all complained when they saw what was happening. 'He has gone to stay at a sinner's house' they said. But Zacchaeus stood his ground and said to the Lord, 'Look, sir, I am going to give half my property to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody I will pay him back four times the amount.' And Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham: for the Son of Man has come to seek out and save what was lost.'

BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING

In Jesus' day, tax collectors were not popular people. They were collaborators with the Romans and were despised by many Jewish people. The tax system allowed them to charge more than what was required so that they could make a profit for themselves. Thus, they were considered sinners by their countrymen. Observers in the crowd that day grumble because Jesus dines with a sinner. Throughout Scripture, Jesus' choice of dinner companions set him apart from other observant Jews of his time. In first century Jewish culture, to dine together was to show a bond of fellowship and peace among those at the table. Observant Jews did not generally dine with foreigners and sinners. Yet, Jesus chooses to honor the tax collector, Zacchaeus, by staying at his house.

Even before Jesus comes to his home, Zacchaeus shows himself to be someone in search of salvation. Zacchaeus, described as short in stature, climbs a tree in order to see Jesus. We know from Luke's description that Zacchaeus was no ordinary tax collector; he was, in fact, the chief tax collector and a person of some wealth. In his search for salvation, he humbled himself by making a spectacle of himself by climbing a tree.

Jesus recognizes the faith of this tax collector exhibited in his search for

salvation and calls him down from the tree. In the hospitality he extends to Jesus and in his conversion of heart, Zacchaeus is raised up by Jesus as a model of salvation.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The name Zacchaeus means 'pure' but the actions of this wealthy tax-collector belie such a name and earn him the title of 'sinner'.
- Jesus addresses Zacchaeus as 'son of Abraham', a title usually reserved for the holy or pious ones. Jesus is clearly indicating that Zacchaeus is as good as anyone else.
- Jericho lies in the Jordan valley just six miles north of the Dead Sea and so has a milder climate than the surrounding barren hills. Herod built a lavish winter palace here.
- The journey of Jesus to Jerusalem is almost complete. Jericho is the last town to be passed through before the steep ascent up to Jerusalem.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Zacchaeus' encounter with Jesus led him to reassess the way he lived in the world and the way he related to those around him. He repented his past wrongs, made restitution and entered into a new way of being. This same journey is the one to which baptism into the Church calls all believers.
