FIRST READING

Numbers 21:4-9

On the way through the wilderness the Israelites lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Ps 77:1 - 2, 34 - 38

Do not forget the works of the Lord!

1. Give heed, my people, to my teaching; turn your ear to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable and reveal hidden lessons of the past. <R>
2. When he slew them then they would seek him, return and seek him in earnest. They would remember that God was their rock, God the Most High their redeemer. <R>

3. But the words they spoke were mere flattery; they lied to him with their lips. For their hearts were not truly with him; they were not faithful to his covenant. <R>

4. Yet he who is full of compassion forgave their sin and spared them. So often he held back his anger when he might have stirred up his rage. <R>

SECOND READING

Philippians 2:6-11

The state of Jesus Christ was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave and became as men are; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross.

But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other name so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GRIEVING FOR CREATION

On this second Sunday of our Season of Creation we grieve for what is being lost in our world affected by over-use and climate change.

We are experiencing the effects of climate change here on the Fleurieu with the drought and the algal bloom.

WHERE CAN WE FIND HOPE AND THE ENERGY TO CARE.

Archbishop O'Regan shared these thoughts in his sermon at the Mass of Creation held last Sunday outdoors in Stockade Park in the city.

"This algal bloom is a sign of what Pope Leo calls "the wounds of sin" written into creation. It is not an isolated incident but part of a larger pattern, rising temperatures, extreme weather - droughts and floods, species loss and fragile ecosystems pushed to the brink by over-use. And yet, amid this sobering reality, the Gospel calls us not to despair but to sow seeds of hope.

The algal bloom may seem like a story of destruction, but it can also be a summons to responsibility. It invites us to ask:

What small seeds can we plant today in our families, our Parishes, our communities that will bear fruit for tomorrow?

The seed, as Jesus teaches, begins small. A smile, a prayer, a decision to recycle, a choice to walk instead of drive, a plant cared for, a community garden, a parish initiative. None of these will change the world overnight but together they form an **ecosystem of care**, grounded in fidelity and nourished by love."

A big thank you to our maintenance and garden groups who take such good care of our Church grounds.



heaven, the Son of Man who is in heaven; and the Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved.'

THE LIGHT ON THE FOOTY FIELD

It was a Friday night, and the local footy oval was buzzing. Families sat on the sidelines with hot chips, kids ran around with their jumper half on, and the floodlights shone down bright. In the middle of the field, Kai, a Year 9 student, was having a rough game. He'd missed a kick, missed a pass, and by halftime, he was on the bench with his head in his hands.

He muttered to himself, "I'm useless. Everyone must think I'm a joke."

From the stands, his dad noticed. He walked down, crouched beside him, and said quietly, "Mate, no matter how many goals you kick or how many mistakes you make, you're my son. Nothing changes that. I love you. Just give it your best, that's all I ask."

Something in Kai shifted. He jogged back onto the field – not suddenly perfect, but lighter. He played with freedom, laughed with his teammates, and even managed a decent kick or two. He knew he was loved, no matter the scoreboard.

That moment is a glimpse of what Jesus is saying in John 3: 13 - 17. God doesn't love us because we're flawless, or because we "score goals" in life. God loves us because we are God's children. God sent Jesus not to condemn us for our dropped marks or mistakes, but to lift us up, to show us what eternal life looks like – a life where we know we're loved beyond measure.

For families, for schools, for parishes, this story is real. Kids, parents, teachers, parishioners – we all have days when we feel like we've failed,

like we don't measure up. But the heart of our faith is this: "God so loved the world that God sent us Jesus." That love is steady. That love heals. That love gives us the courage to get back out there, live fully, and share hope with others.

SIGNS OF HOPE IN OUR HOMES

Jesus points us to a love that is greater than anything we can imagine – a love that heals, restores, and lifts us up. For the people of Israel in the desert, looking up to the bronze serpent became a moment of hope and survival. For us today, looking up to Christ on the cross reminds us that God meets us in our struggles and offers us a way forward.

In our families, in our parishes, and in our busy, sometimes messy lives, we are called to be signs of that same hope. Whether it's the way we forgive, the way we encounter one another, or the way we gather at Mass, we can help each other see Christ more clearly.

Faith isn't just about the next life – Jesus reminds us that eternal life begins now. Every time we choose kindness over resentment, patience over frustration, or generosity over self-interest, we lift up Christ in our homes and communities. And in doing so, we help our children, friends, and neighbours discover the God who brings life in abundance.
