FIRST READING

Jeremiah 17:5–8 The Lord says this: 'A curse on the man who puts his trust in man, who relies on things of flesh, whose heart turns from the Lord. He is like dry scrub in the wastelands: if good comes, he has no eyes for it, he settles in the parched places of the wilderness, a salt land, uninhabited.

'A blessing on the man who puts his trust in the Lord, with the Lord for his hope. He is like a tree by the waterside that thrusts its roots to the stream: when the heat comes it feels no alarm, its foliage stays green; it has no worries in a year of drought, and never ceases to bear fruit.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM *Psalm 1:1-4*

Happy are they who hope in the Lord.

- 1. Happy indeed is the man who follows not the counsel of the wicked; nor lingers in the way of sinners nor sits in the company of scorners, but whose delight is the law of the Lord and who ponders his law day and night. <R>
- 2. He is like a tree that is planted beside the flowing waters, that yields its fruit in due season and whose leaves shall never fade; and all that he does shall prosper. <R>

3. Not so are the wicked, not so! For they like winnowed chaff shall be driven away by the wind. For the Lord guards the way of the just but the way of the wicked leads to doom.

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 15:12, 16–20 If Christ raised from the dead is what has been preached, how can some of you be saying that there is no resurrection of the dead? For if the dead are not raised Christ has not been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, you are still in your sins. And what is more serious, all who have died in Christ have perished. If our hope in Christ has been for this life only, we are the most unfortunate of all people.

But Christ has in fact been raised from the dead, the first fruits of all who have fallen asleep.



INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGE DAY 21ST FEBRUARY

Languages, with their complex implications for identity, communication, social integration, education and development, are of strategic importance for people and planet. Yet, due to globalization processes, they are increasingly under threat, or disappearing altogether. Every two weeks a language disappears taking with it an entire cultural and intellectual heritage. Multilingual and multicultural societies exist through their languages, which transmit and preserve traditional knowledge and cultures in a sustainable way.

CALL TO JOIN THE FIGHT AGAINST ANTI-SEMITISM

Timothy Costelloe SDB head of the Australian Bishops Conference has urged Christians to actively support and protect Jewish-Australians under attack from "the violent and senseless attitude which goes by the name of anti-Semitism".

After dozens of anti-Semitic attacks across the country and terror plots targeting the Jewish community, the Archbishop has issued a call to arms for all Australians to join the fight against "pernicious and destructive" anti-Semitism.

Archbishop Costelloe said the country was confronting a "deeply unpalatable truth that for some in our society the notion of tolerance and respect for each other should not include our Jewish brothers and sisters". He says it is an expression of that senseless hatred for the Jewish people which, when once it went unchecked in Europe, resulted in the horrors of the Holocaust." CathNews

CARITAS ASIA

Caritas Asia has vowed to continue its work in supporting migrants and refugees across the region, despite the impact of the U.S. Agency for International Development's (USAID) funding shutdown on humanitarian operations.

Dr. Benedict Alo D'Rozario, president of Caritas Asia, acknowledged the challenges ahead, particularly in light of Catholic Relief Services (CRS) losing nearly half of its \$1.5 billion annual funding, a substantial portion of which supported refugee and migrant programs.

World Wetlands Day:



Saving our common home, one ecosystem at a time World Wetlands Day, held on 2nd February, aims to raise awareness regarding

the importance of these ecosystems that contribute to biodiversity, climate mitigation and adaptation, freshwater availability and more.

Three parishioners recently attended a forum on Water Local Water and Sustainable Practices at the Coorong, Murray Mouth Lower Lakes Research Centre.

Panel members include, Senior Ngarrindjeri man Lawrie Agius, Gloria Jones and South Australian Water Ambassador Karlene Maywald.

Impacts of the Millennium drought and water over-allocation across the

Murray-Darling Basin left the region on the brink of environmental collapse.

Since late 2010, high flows of freshwater have returned and the region is showing signs of recovery.

However, the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth still need help and a range of environmental projects are underway to continue to improve the health of this precious site so it can cope better in future droughts. <u>https://</u>

his disciples with a great crowd of people from all parts of Judaea and from Jerusalem and from the coastal region of Tyre and Sidon who had come to hear him and to be cured of their diseases.

Then fixing his eyes on his disciples he said:

'How happy are you who are poor: yours is the Kingdom of God. Happy are you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied. Happy you who weep now: you shall laugh.

Happy are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice when that day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven. This was the way their ancestors treated the prophets.

But alas for you who are rich: you are having your consolation now.

Alas for you who have your fill now: you shall go hungry. Alas for you who laugh now: you shall mourn and weep. Alas for you when the world speaks well of you! This was the way their ancestors treated the false prophets.'



BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING

Today's gospel reading, is commonly known as the 'Beatitudes', from the Latin meaning 'blessing'. Both Matthew and Luke report this famous sermon of Jesus, but with slight differences. The main difference is that Luke balances the 'blessings' with a series of 'woes' aimed at would-be disciples who are still bound up with the signs of success in this world.

The form of the Beatitudes found in Luke's Gospel is not unique to Jesus. Beatitudes are found in the Old Testament, such as in the Psalms and in Wisdom literature. They are a way to teach about who will find favour with God. The word blessed in this context might be translated as "happy," "fortunate," or "favoured."

As we listen to this Gospel, the Beatitudes jar our sensibilities. Those who are poor, hungry, weeping, or persecuted are called blessed. This is, indeed, a Gospel of reversals. Those often thought to have been forgotten by God are called blessed. In the list of "woes," those whom we might ordinarily describe as blessed by God are warned about their peril. Riches, possessions, laughter, reputation . . . these are not things that we can depend upon as sources of eternal happiness. They not only fail to deliver on their promise; our misplaced trust in them will lead to our demise. The ultimate peril is in misidentifying the source of our eternal happiness.

The Beatitudes are often described as a framework for Christian living. Our vocation as Christians is not to be first in this world, but rather to be first in the eyes of God. We are challenged to examine our present situation in the context of our ultimate horizon, the Kingdom of God.
