

In our busy, busy lives we often don't have the time to chat with other parishioners after Mass. So take an envelope and write a note to share with one another, to affirm and encourage, to let others




know that you are always there for them, just as Jesus is for us.

SAINT JOHN PAUL II, POPE Feast Day 22nd October (1920 – 2005)



Karol Jozef Wojtyla was born in 1920 in Wadowice, Poland. After ordination to the priesthood and theological studies in Rome, he returned to Poland.

resuming pastoral and academic tasks. He became first auxiliary bishop and, in 1964, Archbishop of Krakow and took part in the Second Vatican Council. On 16 October 1978 he was elected pope and took the name John Paul II. His exceptional skills led him to numerous pastoral visits throughout the world. The heritage left to the Church was above all his rich Magisterium and the promulgation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church as well as the Code of Canon Law for the Latin Church and for the Eastern Churches. He survived an attempt on his life in 1981 and forgave his would-be assassin. No other Pope met as many people as Pope John Paul II. More than 17.6 million pilgrims attended over 1160 of his Wednesday General Audiences. He died peacefully in Rome, 2 April 2005. John Paul II was beatified in Saint Peter's Square on 1st May 2011 by Pope Benedict XVI, his immediate successor. - Catholic Culture

OUR NEW AUSTRALIAN CARDINAL



Bishop Mykola Bychok of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church in Australia (which is now part of the Catholic Church under Pope Francis) has been

named Cardinal of the Catholic Church in Australia. That office has been empty since the passing of Cardinal George Pell. "I am certainly feeling excited, because this appointment is a great privilege - not a privilege granted to me personally, but a privilege granted by Pope Francis to the entire Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church and the Catholic Church in Australia," Cardinal Bychok said. "I understand how much responsibility this appointment entrusts to me. Knowing the difficult times that our Ukrainian people are going through because of the war, I will continue to inform the Catholic world about what is happening in our land and constantly remind them of Ukraine." Cardinal Bychok said being created a cardinal "is also a great responsibility to the Catholic Church in Australia, where faith is gradually being lost and secularisation is spreading.

I ask the Lord to guide me in responding to these challenges with strength and dignity." We pray for our new cardinal in his task of ministering to the Australian Church.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The brothers, James and John, sons of Zebedee, were nicknamed by Jesus 'sons of thunder'.
- Acts 12:2 reports the martyrdom of James. He was killed, probably by decapitation, by Herod Agrippa, grandson of Herod the Great, during a persecution of the early Church.
- According to some traditions John survived until the end of the first century and lived in Ephesus.

They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them, 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt.

This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'



RANSOM FOR MANY

Jesus got the disciples together to settle things down. "Whoever wants to be gre at must become a servant.

Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to

must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not to be served – and then to give away his life in exchange for many who are held hostage."

While Jesus is talking about becoming ransom, his followers are looking for glory. No wonder Jesus groans that they don't know what they're talking about. Of the four gospel writers, Mark is most likely to draw the disciples as out-and-out dumbbells. Since it's the first of the gospels to be written down, Mark's depiction is likely closer to the truth than the other evangelists cared to be.

Alas, these dumbbells are closer to revealing our natural inclinations than we care to admit. We step up to drink the cup of Christ in our Eucharist without much fuss, but when it comes time to share his passion in even the smallest sense, we don't respond to roll call. We're willing to take part in the rituals of religion, but we're nowhere to be found when it's time to be ransom. Servant-hood has little appeal. Still we're prepared to join in the finger-pointing at James and John

seeking credit. We, at least, cover our aspirations a little better than they do.

A RADICAL MESSAGE

There are many symbols that reflect our society, some for better and others for worse. The professional athlete is one of those symbols that seems to endure generation after generation. Children look up to them. Weet-Bix still puts them on their cereal boxes. And all the sports channels give interview after interview. They become our heroes, to be emulated and imitated.

What does it say, then, when athletes are found with corked baseball bats or steroids or illegal golf clubs? It tells us that we live in a society that condones winning no matter what the cost, the importance of being 'Number 1' over simply doing your best, that being guilty only happens when you get caught. And we shrug it off, saying that this is just the way things are.

It is no wonder that young and impressionable people have become so incredibly competitive and the rest of us jaded that nothing surprises us anymore.

The gospel of Jesus stands as a strong counterpoint to the message that is being given. The gospel tells us that we must put others first, put their needs ahead of our own, not worry about who is No. 1. It was a radical message when Jesus first spoke it, and it remains so today in our competitive, win-at-any-cost society.
